

Frequently Asked Questions

What is WWALS?

WWALS Watershed Coalition, Inc. (WWALS) is an IRS 501(c)(3) nonprofit educational corporation advocating for watershed conservation and stewardship of the Withlacoochee, Willacoochee, Alapaha, Little, and Suwannee River watersheds in south Georgia and north Florida through education, awareness, environmental monitoring, and citizen activities.

Who is involved?

Currently WWALS is made up of volunteers from several counties across south Georgia and north Florida in the watersheds of the area, plus one paid staff position, the Suwannee Riverkeeper®. You don't have to be on the board to attend events or be on a committee or to donate. WWALS is fundraising to fully fund an executive director and riverkeeper. Your membership, company, or foundation can help!

Where do you meet?

WWALS holds a publicized paddle outing or other event each month; see the WWALS calendar, http://wwals.net/calendar/. Plus, the board meets quarterly around the watersheds, developing strategies for watershed conservation. Board meetings are open to the public.

Which counties and cities?

WWALS has members from California to Atlanta south past Orlando, especially in the 33 counties that are all or in part in our watersheds. Lowndes County, Georgia, and Columbia County, Florida are our most populous, and our biggest cities are Valdosta, Tifton, and Moultrie, GA, and Lake City, FL. Which rivers?

Our many rivers include: three (Alapaha, Withlacoochee, and Suwannee Rivers), five (plus New and Little Rivers flowing into the Withlacoochee); nine (plus Willacoochee, Alapahoochee, and Little Alapaha Rivers flowing into the Alapaha, and Dead River flowing out of it); twelve (Black River, Little River, and Gopher River flowing into the Suwannee River). How is this different from Rivers Alive or Georgia Adopt-A-Stream?

WWALS is an educational organization, working with the community at large to provide information about the conservation of the watersheds to landowners, recreational users, interested citizens, farmers, corporations and other interested parties. Our intent is not to duplicate any existing organizations but to identify resources and groups and and to advocate for issues which are an integral part of our watershed.
