- •"Lobbyist" is a person who is employed and receives payment, or who contracts for economic consideration, for the purpose of lobbying, or a person who is principally employed for governmental affairs by another person or governmental entity to lobby on behalf of that other person or governmental entity. (112.3215(1)(h), F.S.)

The Board may act upon (including reconsideration) any agenda item at any time during the meeting. The agenda may be changed only for good cause as determined by the Chair and stated in the record. If, after the regular time for Public Comment, the agenda is amended to add an item for consideration, the Chair shall allow public comment on the added agenda item prior to the Board taking action thereon.

All decisions of the Chair concerning parliamentary procedures, decorum, and rules of order will be final, unless they are overcome by a majority of the members of the Board in attendance.

RECOMMENDATION

Authorize the Executive Director to enter into a contract for the acquisition of the Camp & Abel Tract in Hamilton County.

BACKGROUND

In December 2020, the Board approved the staff recommendation to enter into detailed assessments and negotiations for the acquisition of three parcels located in Hamilton County comprising a total of 266.16 acres +/-. Due to budgeting, COVID restrictions, and an inability for contractors to access the property due to water levels, the detailed assessment was delayed until 2021-2022. After obtaining an appraisal and a satisfactory Phase 1, Environmental Site Assessment (ESA), the District entered into negotiations with the sellers to acquire the property. The property was appraised with a value of \$959,000. During negotiations, staff has discussed the possibility of acquiring a conservation easement, in lieu of a fee acquisition, and has explored options to acquire only one of the parcels (Jerry Branch), however, the sellers are not amenable to these options.

After negotiations, the District and the sellers have reached an agreement for the District to acquire the property for \$870,000, subject to approval by the Governing Board. To date, the District has expended \$18,200 for pre-acquisition costs, including the appraisal and Phase 1, Environmental Site Assessment. Closing costs will be shared between the parties. The sellers will be required to provide clear and marketable title to the District subject only to approved exceptions.

The sellers have also requested, as part of the transaction, that the parcels be identified in District maps, literature and any signage which may be erected, as the "Camp Family Tract" to recognize the family for their conservation interests in this property.

Staff is aware of the letter of support for the acquisition submitted by the Florida Trail Association.

Staff is recommending that the Board authorize the Executive Director to enter into a contract for sale on the above terms.

RE: Springs Protection Awareness Month Proclamation

RECOMMENDATION

Proclaim April 2023 as Springs Protection Awareness Month.

BACKGROUND

In recent years, the Florida Legislature has adopted resolutions recognizing the importance of Florida's springs and natural resources by declaring the month of April as Springs Protection Awareness Month.

The District contains more than 450 documented springs, including the highest concentration of freshwater springs in Florida, and the highest concentration of first-magnitude springs in the United States. The District is defined by world-renowned springs, including 14 of the 30 Outstanding Florida Springs as identified by the Legislature.

Springs provide habitat for wildlife and plant species, as well as natural, recreational, and economic value. Recreational use of springs supports ecotourism in the region providing opportunities for swimming, fishing, diving, kayaking, canoeing, and wildlife viewing. The estimated total economic benefits associated with recreational use (due to direct spending, supply chain activity and income re-spending) supports over 1,000 full and part-time jobs and generates \$9.4 million annually in economic output¹. These international resources are a major priority for the District.

Increasing public awareness of the District's ongoing work to protect springs is a key part of accomplishing the District mission.

RE: District Land Management and Twin Rivers State Forest Activity Summary

BACKGROUND

District contractors completed 115 acres of groundcover restoration through direct bulk seeding on the Gar Pond and Mattair Springs tracts.

District contractors reforested 252 acres by hand-planting containerized longleaf pine seedlings on the Mattair Springs, High Springs Wellfield, RO Ranch, and Gar Pond tracts.

District contractors completed 93 acres of site-prep and whole tree chipping on the Lake Rowell and Santa Fe River Ranch tracts.

District contractors are mulching vegetation on the Peacock Slough Tract.

District contractors are woods mowing on the Christian and Withlacoochee Hills tracts.

District contractors are repairing roads in the Mallory Swamp Tract and hydrologic repairs at Natural Well Branch Tract.

The Suwannee Bicycle Association sponsored IDIDARIDE XXIX, a 50-mile off-road bicycle challenge ride on bike trails on District lands in White Springs. There were 311 riders and over 100 volunteers participating in the event.

Florida Forest Service (FFS) burned 241 acres in Twin Rivers State Forest. When available, the FFS will provide a crew to burn additional acres on both District tracts and TRSF.

The Prescribed Fire Enhancement Project, which consisted of 33.54 acres of the Black Tract, was completed on January 28.

The Florida Forest Service treated three acres of Tongue Oil Trees and one acre of Chinaberry Trees on the Anderson Springs Tract.

The public recreation areas, as well as access roads on Twin Rivers State Forest, are being monitored and cleaned as needed.

Debris cleanup was conducted on Ellaville Tract.

The attached report summarizes the status of current District and TRSF activities for the preceding month:

Conservation Easement Monitoring: During the report period, no additional conservation easements were inspected by District staff.

Vegetation Management Projects: During the report period, approximately 735 additional acres of roller chopping, and woods mowing was completed on the Mallory Swamp Tract in Lafayette County. 297 acres of woods mowing and mulching was completed on several other tracts throughout the District.

In Fiscal Year 2023, vegetation management work will be conducted for fuel reduction, natural community restoration, and wildfire mitigation purposes.

RE: Agricultural Water Use Monitoring Report

BACKGROUND

In September 2012, the District began a program of water use monitoring for agricultural water use reporting on wells 8 inches in diameter or greater.

As of February 22, 2023, the District is monitoring 1,542 (228.5 MGD) of a total of 1,619 active permitted wells (237.8 MGD). The remaining 72 active wells not yet monitored are scheduled for site visits to determine the type of monitoring that will be implemented. An additional 282 proposed wells have yet to be drilled.

The District offers three options for monitoring: electric provided by the power company, telemetry on diesel systems, and self-reporting. To date, farmer electric agreements from cooperatives are in effect on 776 (143.5 MGD) monitoring points. The District currently employs telemetry on 275 (48.0 MGD) diesel-powered systems. There are currently 8 (0.98 MGD) self-monitored points.

Additionally, there are currently 483 (36.7 MGD) sites for which monitoring is currently not feasible. Staff visit these sites each year to reevaluate the feasibility of monitoring.




Figure 1. Well status and monitoring type for all wells with water use monitoring conditions as of February 22, 2023.




Figure 2. Status of flow data collection by source within the District's agricultural monitoring network as of February 22, 2023.

The attached figures show the current well status and monitoring type for all wells with water use monitoring conditions (Figure 1), and the status of flow data collection by source within the Districts' agricultural monitoring network (Figure 2).

RECOMMENDATION

Authorize the Executive Director to amend Contract 20/21-172 with Southern Cross Organics & Energy, LLC to change the District maximums for each category to a District maximum for the entire project.

BACKGROUND

The Suwannee River Water Management District (District) has provided agricultural cost-share funds along with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection as part of the Suwannee River Partnership to help agricultural producers implement best management practices. Best management practices help farmers conserve water and improve water quality in the District.


The District entered into contract with Southern Cross Organics and Energy, LLC (SCOE) on June 30, 2021, to expand their wastewater storage capacity. During the construction of the project, the earthworks portion came in over the estimated amount by \$109,979. This amounted to a 50% reimbursement instead of 75%. SCOE came in under budget in the remaining categories by approximately \$66,000. The producer requests that the District maximums per category be changed to a District maximum for the overall project, such that the remaining funds could be put toward the overages on the earthworks portion of the contract. This will be a nocost amendment and the total cost share amount for this project will not change.

Exhibit A lists the cost share items and funding breakdown. Funding for this project is included in the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Final Budget.

RE: Amendment to Contract 21/22-013, Agreement with St. Johns River Water

Management District

RECOMMENDATION

Authorize the Executive Director to amend Contract #21/22-013 with St. Johns River Water Management District to provide surface and groundwater laboratory analyses for an amended amount not to exceed \$145,600.

BACKGROUND

In July 2022, the Governing Board authorized the Executive Director to renew a memorandum of agreement (MOA) with the St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD) to provide surface and groundwater laboratory analyses for an amount not to exceed \$130,000, for the period beginning October 1, 2022, and ending September 30, 2023. The laboratory analysis of the District's water quality samples is a key component of the District's long term water quality monitoring network and data collection.

The agreement specifies that if the number of water quality samples submitted to the SJRWMD lab exceeds 1,100 an amendment may be required. Water Resources staff anticipate the number of samples to exceed 1,100 during the contract renewal period. This amendment will accommodate up to 130 additional samples per year to meet increased water quality monitoring needs. The total number of samples under the new agreement will be 1,230. The amendment will allow for an additional amount not to exceed \$15,600. The MOA renewal, and this amendment, will expire on September 30, 2023.

Funding for this agreement and the amendment is included in the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Final Budget.
