# With school back in session, officials urging bus safety

Cars passing stopped school buses are on the rise, as are child deaths related to this crime. More than 24 million children take the bus to school, and across the United States more than 13 million times a year an impatient or careless driver will pass a bus illegally.

The greatest danger for children isn't in actually riding on the bus - it is getting on or off of it. A national average of 19 children each year are killed by drivers not paying attention, and the average age ranges from only 5 to 7 years old.

This school year, like others, the Lanier County Sheriff's Office and Lanier County schools are working together to monitor school bus stops. They are specifically looking for vehicles that pass buses while stopped loading or unloading children.

Sheriff Nick Norton has assigned deputies to watch as the buses make their stops. With the school year just starting, all drivers should plan to leave a little early and slow down, especially when kids are waiting for a school bus or playing near the road.

"We have to remember these are children and they sometimes do the unexpected things. We need to slow down and be aware," said Sheriff Nick Norton.

During the last school year, the driver of a semi-truck was cited by deputies after they failed to stop for two different buses that were stopped in different locations.

"The driver was distracted and not paying attention to the road. We are fortunate no one was injured," Norton

According to Georgia law, drivers are required to stop for all school buses when the lighting is active and the stop sign deployed. The penalties for passing a stopped school bus include a possible fine up to \$1,000.

"That school bus is yellow for a reason," Norton points out. "That (color) means caution and slow down. Allow yourself a few minutes extra to drive and be aware that children may be playing on the roadside as they wait for their bus."

Just because you don't see an officer on location, doesn't mean you won't be caught passing a school bus. Georgia was one of the first states in the US to require school buses to have stop-arm cameras. That fine of up to \$1000 may arrive in your mailbox, if the stop-arm camera catches you in the act.

# Maintaining Milltown's Murals

Lakeland is known as the "Historic Mural City" for the "Milltown Murals" that span the town. These murals are a constant surprise for new people passing through. They cover many historical people, places and symbolize events from the 1920s-era. The name 'Milltown Murals' comes from Lakeland's original name, Milltown.

The Lakeland/Milltown area (which was originally considered a part of Alapaha) was first settled by James and Elizabeth Patten in 1819 - the name 'Milltown' came in 1857. It was changed to 'Lakeland' on September 15 of 1925 - in fact mural #6 commemorates this change.

They're a beloved part of the town and, for many younger or newer residents, it seems as though they have always been there.

In fact, the murals have been up for less than thirty years and for the last eight of those years, artist Andrew Sabori has been renovating them. With thirty-eight murals spreading all over the town, he has his work cut out for him.

Many know very little about the history of the murals themselves. In 1998, local community leader and archivist/historian Nell Patten Roquemore (known by most as 'Ms. Nell') commissioned the murals. And yes, she is related to the original settlers of Milltown/Lakeland.

Her passion for her hometown of Lakeland knew no equal. Even after traveling the world extensively (see the Lanier County Advocate: Volume 11, edition 8 - September 22 of 2021 to read just a fraction of her incredible story), Lakeland was her home and her love, through and

through. Rocquemore was a life-long lover of the arts and owned a healthy obsession with the beautification of Lakeland. Those two things within her combined wonderfully with her passion for Lakeland's history. The result was the idea for the murals.

So, in 1998 Roquemore found two artists (Ralph Waldrop and Billy Love) to create that vision that now graces so much of her beloved town. The Milltown Foundation was created in order to fund the project.

The thirty-eight murals include large ones that span entire buildings, like #3 The Church Hotel (a hotel built in 1896 by Tom Church that was destroyed by a fire in 1941) to smaller ones like #26 The Cows which is exactly what it sounds like. Did you know that in the 1920s, cows roamed the town freely?

Many of the murals show just how much the town and county has grown in just over a century. The Byrd Building (#2) was originally built in 1904, but when Lanier County was created in  $1920,\,$  the upper floor was converted into a space for a courtroom, the clerk of courts office, a law office and the main office for the Lanier County Telephone Company. The mural depicts J.L. Byrd standing by the doorway, while Vera Wooten - Lakeland's telephone operator for 39 years - sits working. That little boy in the window is her two year old son Benny, watching the street and people below.

Some of the murals were more personal for Roquemore. #12 The Patten Playhouse now rests in Roquemore Memorial Park - it's fifth location in just under 100 years - and shows Roquemore as a young girl with her sister picking flowers.

Just under 20 excited paddlers surrounded the boat entrance at Banks Lake on August 1. They listened to the safety briefing given by first-time outings leader, Meredith Crosby. Crosby was friendly, bubbly and as eager to get out on the water as every one there.

Riverkeeper Suwannee John S. Quarterman was there as well. While overseeing the event, he was happy to answer any questions or help in any way.

After a slight delay, the group began their paddle. Lots of laughter and excited chatter could be heard across the water. Event members chose their own path to the first meet-up location. Some went in pairs in singleperson kayaks. Others had two-person kayaks or the

canoes from Banks Lake. These canoes were rented for free for the outing (courtesy the Lakeland-Lanier Chamber of Commerce and Banks Lake Outdoors).

Everyone went own way as Crosby sent a scout ahead to find a new spot to observe bats. According to US Fish and Wildlife Service, bats are one of the most important misunderstood animals on our planet. "Bats play an essential role in pest control, pollinating plants and dispersing seeds. Recent studies estimate that bats eat enough pests to save more than \$1 billion per year in crop damage and pesticide costs in the United States corn industry alone." At Banks Lake, bats can be seen descending the trees as the sun goes down, skimming the water for

bugs.

As the group spread out, Crosby and Quarterman helped the members by pointing out the attractions of Banks Lake and sharing information on the Full Sturgeon Moon. This month the full moon was also a "supermoon." A supermoon happens when the moon comes nearly as close to the Earth as it can get at the same time that it is full (or new). With the full moon also being a supermoon, the size of it seems much larger.

These outings are hosted

by the WWALS (standing for Withlacoochee, Willacoochee, Alapaha, Little, Santa Fe, Suwannee) Watershed Coalition, a nonprofit corporation. WWALS holds at least one paddle outing a month, plus frequent cleanups, and even occasional hikes. For nonmembers, the outings fee is \$10 per person, or \$11 online. For members, the outings are free and the membership dues go to help the Coalition with

# Alapaha Judicial Circuit discusses child abuse cases

According to District Attorney Studstill, the primary purpose of the meeting was to gather members from these agencies and others within the circuit to implement a Protocol

Agricultural Building in Prosecution of Alleged Berrien County and was Cases of Child Abuse. Studstill addressed the members in attendance reviewed and proposed protocol. "The Protocol outlines the procedures to be used in investigating and prosecuting cases arising from alleged sexual abuse and sexual exploitation as well as the procedures to be followed for each agency within our circuit. The Protocol mirrors the state's model protocol for the investigation and prosecution of child abuse cases, but we have modified ours to accommodate our local organizations."

Studstill went on to state, "We appreciate everyone who attended  $_{
m this}$ meeting provided input for the implementation of this protocol. Most of the members are part of a multi-disciplinary team which we commonly refer to as 'MDT'. These team members consist of law enforcement officials, DFCS. the district attorney's office, the Child Advocacy Center, mental  $_{
m the}$ Haven, health and medical professionals, domestic

the for the Investigation and violence shelters when a child is involved and others who provide a coordinated response in these cases. The overall goal of this protocol is to  $increase \, the \, effectiveness \,$ of investigations while reducing the stress and risk of secondary trauma to children. The MDT currently in place for our circuit meets monthly to share information regarding child abuse cases in Berrien, Cook, and Lanier Counties."

addition In implementing the protocol, Studstill said, "I am proud to announce that we are also planning to implement MDTs for the remaining two counties, Atkinson and Clinch. It was my honor to spearhead this meeting and discuss the protocol. We obtained acceptance signatures from all who attended the meeting. The fact that this meeting was so well attended shows the commitment that people within our circuit have for the protection of children. My office is committed to ensuring that we all move forward and implement the best practices for investigation and prosecution of these cases."

broad or narrow the scope of the subject, is a visual link with history - a way to give eternal life to a moment in time and make more relatable the city's past.

The problem with many of the murals was that a lot of them were done on wood - time and weather have done their collective damage. Fading, water damage, chipping... It was wearing down the beautiful artwork.

Roquemore wanted the murals preserved, symbolic of the past that she was so passionate about. As an author (Rocks, Roots and Recollections) as well as an archivist (Lanier County: The Land and Its People), some of her own art lives in print. Other kinds of art are far more fragile.

Andrew Sabori was her answer. While Sabori was in Albany showing the work he'd done recreating The Lost Mural of Ellis Island (www. thelostmuralofellisisland.com), he'd been commissioned to create work. Around the time he'd finished, Roquemore was looking for someone to handle the repairs. She was pointed to Sabori. Roquemore asked him to do the restoration work and was happy to have him add his own personal touches, his own style.

Sabori, who lives in Tifton, is a warm and friendly man that is clearly passionate about his work. He can talk about it endlessly and is eager to share what he loves with others. His wife, Roberta, is almost always by his side, working in an administrative capacity, handling requests and emails.

The boards for the replacement murals are a mixture of fiberglass and metal. When they arrive cut into the right shapes, Sabori paints the mural. He is not replicating the old artist's work exactly, but creating versions that are very close - just with his own style and a few aesthetic choices. For instance, Sabori prefers slightly brighter colors for their ability to catch the eye and warm up the scenes. The brighter murals stand out, instead of blending into the buildings.

When his painting has been completed, John Fitton - retired from military service and the Chamber of Commerce - helps install the new murals. Sabori and Fitton work together. Fitton drills holes where Sabori can most easily paint over the bolts. Sometimes, the bolts are used as three dimensional accents of the art - like buttons or a part of a dog's collar.

Many members of the community have stopped to watch him work and have spoken to him about the paintings. He's heard many other stories about Nell Roquemore from

passersby. Her legacy continues to spread through the murals even through conversations between

Sabori only works in the mornings: not only due to the weather, but also due to the fact that the fiberglass panels have a coating of metal on them. They get hot quickly.

Only one item has been vandalized, the vehicle on #25 The Ice House. It had been scratched, much like a vehicle might be keyed. The truck was taken down, repaired, and replaced.

As a fitting tribute, Sabori created a panel for Ms Nell herself, after her passing in 2021. You can find her standing at the Lakeland-Lanier Board of Commissioners, ready to great those entering.

She would have been pleased to know she is there to watch over the city she loved so much.

Anyone can visit the Lakeland-Lanier Chamber of Commerce 8 S Valdosta Road to pick up a map of all of the locations. They can either take a pamphlet with details on all of the murals or scan the QR code on the map and listen on their phone.

## ANDREW SABORI SPOTLIGHT

Andrew Sabori was born in San Jose, California. He attended the Santa Barbara Art Institute and graduated from the University of California at Santa Barbara with a BA in Fine Arts. He has thousands of completed works including posters, paintings and murals spanning both coasts of the United States.

Sabori has a exhibit currently on display at the Valdosta Main Library until Sept. It will then be moved to the Pine Hills Branch in Albany.

He painted murals for the 1996


Olympics. His most recent accomplishment is a huge one: two of his paintings (a part of the Lost Murals of Ellis Island project) are being displayed in the "Art in Embassies" at the U.S. Department of State. Ambassador Manuel Micaller, the US Ambassador to Tajikistan, saw his work and asked for it specifically. After the shortterm display in the "Art in Embassies" exhibit, the painting will be moved to Tajikistan for three years.



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# **Hauling Rocks**

The stream on my grandfather's farm is shallow and narrow where it begins, only inches deep and two feet wide. The spring which feeds it is small but reliable, even in the dry months of summer. A hundred feet in the woods, however, is a much different look.

Two tributaries, located closely together, join the flow. They run about half the year, mostly in winter and spring, then go dry for a while. Their contribution is nominal much of the time, but substantial after hard rains.

Not much has changed on the first part of the stream since my early childhood. Intermittent flooding from the branches, however, has eroded the earthen walls farther down and deepened the streambed. Some banks have a fourfoot drop and are ten feet apart rather than two.

Erosion has taken a gradual toll as seasonal water has whittled away soil and washed it toward the Ocmulgee River. I'm trying to stop that process, or at least slow it down. That's why I've been hauling rocks.

My first efforts were focused on a small peninsula. It's only 30 feet long and 20 feet across, but clearing vines and underbrush revealed undeniable charm. It's a miniscule replica of

Florida, complemented by one main attraction, a leaning tree. Our granddaughter, Megan, once climbed it to escape an alligator. The tree and the memory are special.

Eight boulders are in a cluster near the spring, each about the size of a rocking chair. They're artistically positioned to overlook the branch. My brother, Jimmy, wondered aloud one day how such large rocks came to rest there. I thought God arranged them, but now I'm guessing Grandaddy lent a hand.

Stones from baseball size to five-gallon buckets are scattered throughout the woods. I've been tossing them in piles for a couple of years, saving them for later use. And I've come across a dozen or so rock piles that have been there for decades. Some were only partially hidden by nature. Others had multiple layers of rocks covered in topsoil and required some persuasion to leave.

I had been pulling up old fencing for several weeks before I realized the proximity of rock collections to the wire. They were all on the interior side of the fence nearest to the water, which led to another theory about my grandfather's fences.

Woods are on both sides of the fencing, which I thought was put

there to give livestock access to the stream. The piled rocks, however, cause me to believe that part of what I've always known as woodlands was once in pasture.

It would make sense that rocks were thrown over the fence to get them out of the way, or maybe piled there before the fence was put up. The boulders are too heavy for lifting, but a mule team could have pulled them down the slope.

Maude and Tom were a mule-horse pair that my mother remembers from early childhood. Maude, the horse, was gentle and Mama would take slow rides as her father or older brothers held the reins and led her. Tom was a good worker but not keen on entertaining. How the pair fell into

an open well in the field, I'm not sure. Apparently the wooden sides had collapsed or been taken down, perhaps to make it easier to fill an abandoned hole with rocks. Maude went in headfirst with Tom falling on top of her. Tom was okay but Maude had to be shot by my grandfather, a sad day on the farm.

Rocks have always intrigued me, partly because my mother has collected them over the years for her flower garden and patio. They don't bloom but never need watering, plus have

ancient stories to share if we listen closely.

The same stones that were unwelcome in the pasture were thankfully not discarded. Now they're quite useful for lining the banks of the stream. I trust they'll slow the erosion, and perhaps even help regain lost ground as a respite for passing sand.

During the past decades these rocks have changed very little. Yet they've transitioned from being unwanted to greatly valued. It was a matter of finding a purpose and being given an opportunity.

Granddaddy would be pleased those rocks are being put to use. I hope fifty years from now someone will find they were beneficial to the stream, and maybe even listen to their story. That's why I've been hauling rocks.



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# Beef heifer development deadline approaching

The deadline to send in nomination forms for heifers in the 2023-2024 Georgia Heifer Evaluation and Reproductive Development (HERD) program is coming up!

Conducted in Tifton, the HERD program allows producers to consign beef heifers for heifer development. The program was designed to serve and educate the beef industry in Georgia, including demonstration of feeding and health programs that result in replacement heifers reaching target weights required for successful breeding performance and providing a method of evaluating heifers on performance and reproductive traits. The HERD program is a cooperative effort between cattle producers, animal health professionals, the Georgia Cattlemen's Association, the UGA Animal and Dairy Science Department, the UGA Diagnostic Lab and College of Veterinary Medicine, and Georgia County Extension Agents.

Heifers are consigned to the program in fall, managed by the UGA HERD Team including being bred, and sold in the HERD Sale in spring. Producers may also buy back their bred heifers. Additionally, the live sale is open to any beef producer to view or purchase animals. Eligible heifers for the 2023-2024 program must have been born September 1st, 2022, through November 30th, 2022. They must be home-grown animals and can be registered or commercial.

Nomination forms to consign heifers must be postmarked by September 1st, 2023. For complete program rules and nomination forms, visit the Georgia HERD Program at www.beef.caes.uga. edu/programs/live-animal-programs or visit the Extension office in-person for more information.
