

We acknowledge that this is a reimbursement grant, that it requires a 20% cash match, and that the grant term is one year from the date of the grant agreement, by which time the project must be completed. In addition to the cash match, we will provide volunteer hours designing, preparing, and distributing cards and signs, planting signs at the water, holding educational events (paddle outings, cleanups, webinars, etc.). The cards and signs contain URLs and QRcodes leading people to our more extensive online educational materials, with text, tables, pictures, and interactive maps: http://www.net/water-trails/ These online materials list, describe, and often picture numerous points of interest such as relics or sites of old bridges (rail and road) and fords, obstacles such as deadfalls or power lines, beaches, waterfalls, geology, plants, and animals.

ARWT Brochures

In addition to safety and etiquette information, these brochures contain eloquent descriptions, pictures, and a painting of what paddlers can see along these rivers, encouraging conservation of the environment. They recommend becoming certified for water quality testing, and they have the WWALS motto about stewardship and conservation, plus a URL and a QRcode leading viewers to web pages and online maps.

ARWT Rack Cards

This time we propose to make rack cards, which are the same format as folded-up z-fold brochures, but only one sheet, front and back, with basic information and QR codes leading to our online information. These are less expensive, and are for distribution at welcome centers and rest stops.

ARWT Road Signs

Lowndes County made and planted road signs for the ARWT at Naylor Boat Ramp. We paid the Georgia Department of Transportation to make and plant signs at each of the nine other Georgia ARWT access points.

Unfortunately, some of them are missing, specifically at Mayday Landing on Howell Road in Echols County. So that's one set of ARWT road signs needed.

These road signs are designed according to criteria provided by Georgia River Network for Georgia Water Trails, with three signs per post. The top sign has the water trail name and icons for the type of access (canoe, kayak, and for boat





ramps also power boats). The middle sign has the access point name and the county name. The third sign is a directional arrow. Each access point gets two pairs of these signposts, differing only in the direction of the arrow.

ARWT Signs at the Water

We have pioneered a set of two metal signs on a single post at the water; see below under WLRWT Signs at the Water. On the ARWT, these signs are missing and presumed stolen at Lakeland Boat Ramp at GA 122 in Lanier County, and in Echols County Mayday Landing at Howell Road and Statenville Boat Ramp at GA 94. Plus we want to place signs at Banks Lake Boat Ramp. So that is 4 sets of ARWT at-water signs needed.

WLRWT Rack Cards

This time we proposed to make rack cards for welcome centers and the like.

WLRWT Road Signs

We thank Lowndes County for agreeing to make and plant road signs in that county. These WLRWT road signs are the same format as for the ARWT, except of course they say at the top Withlacoochee and Little River Water Trail.

However, the county has not made signs for Folsom Bridge Landing at GA 122 on the Little River, nor on the Withlacoochee River for Hagan Bridge Landing at GA 122, or Franklinville Landing at Franklinville Road.

In addition, the road signs have been stolen from Knights Ferry Boat Ramp on the Withlacoochee River. So that's 4 sets of WLRWT road signs needed.

WLRWT Signs at the Water

Thanks to DNR for funding the first sets of WLRWT at-water signs, which we printed and planted signs at the water for all 19 WLRWT access points in Georgia. Each location gets a pair of metal signs, each 12x18 inches. They have information about safety, etiquette, environment, and maps of the entire water trail and nearby, and how long it will take to get to the next access point. They also list points of interest upstream and down, with miles to get there, including environmental and safety concerns such as rapids and deadfalls, beaches good for lunch breaks, bridges or historical sites of bridges and ferries, etc. They have sponsoring organization logos, including a DNR logo.

Unfortunately, several of these at-water signs have been shot up or stolen, specifically from Folsom Bridge Landing at GA 122 and Troupville Boat Ramp at GA 133 on the Little River, and from the Withlacoochee River at Hagan Bridge Landing at GA 122, Knights Ferry Boat Ramp, and Clyattville-Nankin Boat Ramp. And we want to place a set at Sugar Creek. So that's 6 sets of WLRWT at-water signs needed.

Suwannee River Water Trail (SRWT)

We plan to put signs at three sites on the Suwannee River in Georgia: Stephen C. Foster State Park Boat Ramp, Griffis Fish Camp Landing, and Fargo Boat Ramp. While we have extensive online SRWT materials, these will be the first physical signs on the Suwannee River, both at-water and road signs. We do not plan to make SRWT rack cards, because most of the Suwannee River is covered by Florida's Suwannee River Wilderness Trail.







Educational events

Our water trail signs are also seen by all the participants in our numerous river cleanups, as well as the annual Mayor and Chairman's Paddle that involves Troupville Boat Ramp, with Lowndes County Chairman Bill Slaughter and Valdosta Mayor Scott James Matheson. https://wwwals.net/?p=61317

On paddle outings we frequently note geology such as fossils and at rapids; one of our board members and outings leaders is a Practicing Geologist. We often encounter interesting biology, such as floating marsh pennywort or haunts of specific animals. Many of these things get added to our online water trail maps afterwards, and some of them go directly onto at-water signs.

We have received a grant from Hamilton County, Florida, to do similar at-water signs on the Withlacoochee, Alapaha, and Suwannee Rivers in Florida. Of course, any DNR funds will only be used in Georgia, not Florida.

Troupville River Camp

As you know, back in 2019 WWALS applied to the Georgia Outdoor Stewardship Program (GOSP) for a grant to purchase the land between the Troupville Boat Ramp and the Little River Confluence with the Withlacoochee River, and to build a Troupville River Camp, with air-conditioned bathrooms with hot and cold running water, and five elevated and screened sleeping platforms with electricity. http://wwals.net/?p=50591 In December 2022, Lowndes County purchased that land. A new economic development and well-being organization called One Valdosta-Lowndes is working on rounding up the remaining funds for ongoing maintenance, in anticipation of another GOSP grant application. That project will be at the center of the Withlacoochee and Little River Water Trail, with all these WLRWT signs leading to and from it.

I look forward to receiving the application form for the educational RTP grant.
