This **Alapaha River Water Conference** is **FREE** and will be followed by a short paddle trip outing on the Alapaha River with experienced or beginning paddlers welcome! Also, if you are not a member or have not renewed your membership for 2015, it's easy to join or do so online today at <a href="http://www.wwals.net/donations/">http://www.wwals.net/donations/</a>. You do not have to be a member to come on this outing. If you like the experience, we recommend that you join to support the efforts of WWALS. We will drive about 10 miles from the conference site to the put in at the Hwy 135 Bridge and paddle upstream about 30-45 minutes and then return to the start. This trip is appropriate for novice paddlers, but will require some physical exertion since the first portion is against the current. Participants must bring their own boats and life jackets. There will be a limited number of spaces in boats for those who don't have boats (contact Bret Wagenhorst at 229-392-5513 if you need a space). All participants must know how to swim or tread water. This outing continues our exploration of the <a href="https://www.wyals.net/donations/">Alapaha River Water Trail</a>.

The Alapaha River Water Trail connects about 125 miles of the 202-mile Alapaha River from US 82 in Berrien County, Georgia to the Suwannee River in Hamilton County, Florida. Its tea-colored tannin waters class it as a blackwater river, flowing below bald cypress, longleaf, slash, and loblolly pines, and majestic oaks, with great blue herons, snapping turtles, alligators, and fish. Mostly flat, the Alapaha River also contains rapids, many springs, and the Alapaha Sink and the Dead River Sink where it goes <u>underground</u> until it comes back up in the Alapaha Rise. Covering its entire flood plain in the rainy season, and less than a foot deep in spots during dry spells, the Alapaha River is a treasure and a challenge. The Alapaha River Water Trail also includes the Alapahoochee River, as well as many lakes, ponds, and swamps that are boatable year round.
